# **September Meeting Update**

It kicked off an interest in SWLing and Bruce still has dozens of QSL cards from international broadcasters who, unfortunately, are not as numerous as back then. Then a 4H unit on radio led to his becoming an announcer on a 1000-watt daytime station near his home in northwestern Wisconsin. There, a consulting engineer schooled him in antennas, towers ground planes and audio proofs-of-performance.

Upon retirement, Bruce was interested in learning more about actual radio transmission...and he had some available time. Presto chango! He's now an extra class ham...and a member of SEMARC based on the kindness and skill of our VE Team...and our practice to offer a free membership to successful candidates from our exam sessions.

Bruce and NAOL form the international element of SEMARC...members who make the trip from Minneapolis over here to east metro area to be part of our club. Also of note...a couple of cheese heads as part of the club. Just goes to show you that a willingness to take newcomers under your wing, share with them the magic of radio and give them a chance to find their interests in radio and the club works wonders!

I happened to take a look at my log the other night. Some of you know I only switched to computer logging about six years ago. Still have a bunch of ARRL spiral bound logbooks.

For three years, everything was OK. Then my shack laptop experienced a catastrophic drive failure....and the log could not be recovered. Of course, I left it with a vendor and explicit instructions to transfer data to the new laptop. Didn't happen. Maybe one reason for you to consider LOTW, as I would have been able to download my history to the new machine. Lesson maybe learned.

Anyhow, now three years later, I took a look at the stats section of the N3FJP log. In those three years, there have been 5,000 QSOs. 65.1% were in CW; 31.5% were in other digital modes; 3.2% were SSB. (yes, Virginia, I do work some voice).

I've "worked" fifty states and 5 Canadian provinces; 140 DX entities; and 761 Counties. Too bad, as I had worked 2900+ counties in my previous log.

I always enjoy hearing about other hams' operating history...along with any interesting stories they might have. It's been a while since we gathered around the table and shared that sort of information. Let's all take a look at our most recent logs, interesting QSOs and make one of our programs in the new year to share that info with each other.
